Report of the trustees for the year ended 31 December 2007

The trustees submit their annual report and audited financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2007 for Peace Brigades International United Kingdom Section ("PBI UK").

Reference and administrative details

The Charity Commission charity registration number is 1101016.

The Companies House registered number is 3912587.

The registered office and operational address of PBI UK is at 1 B Waterlow Road, London N19 5NJ.

Structure, governance and management

PBI UK is a charitable company limited by guarantee. It was incorporated with Companies House registration number 3912587 under a Memorandum of Association on 19 January 2000 and is governed under its Articles of Association. It was registered with the Charity Commission on 3 December 2003 with charity number 1101016.

Trustees are sought from adverts in journals, websites and newspapers, particularly those with a connection to the human rights and charity sectors. Potential trustees are invited to attend 3 initial monthly Trustee meetings as observers to gain more knowledge and understanding of the organisation and are then subject to a formal interview by one or more existing Trustees before being proposed for appointment. If elected, they meet key staff, and are provided with an induction pack of key documents setting out PBI UK procedures and history.

Structure, governance and management (continued)

The Articles of Association require a minimum number of 3 trustees at any time, and that at least one-third of trustees must retire by rotation at each Annual General Meeting even if they offer themselves for re-appointment. Trustees may fill a vacancy or appoint an additional trustee but a trustee appointed in this way holds office only until the next Annual General Meeting.

All trustees are members of the management committee. They meet monthly to administer the charity's activities and at other times to carry out strategic planning. A full time paid co-ordinator is appointed by the management committee to manage the day-to-day operations of the organisation, including supervision of staff and the numerous volunteer activities

The objectives of PBI UK are primarily carried out by supporting (both operationally and financially) the projects of Peace Brigades International ("PBI"), a U.S.A incorporated non-profit organisation and registered as an overseas company (registered number FCO19368) in the United Kingdom under s.691 of the Companies Act 1985, and through which the protective accompaniment programmes are carried out.

PBI UK is one of 16 country groups around the world that support the field programmes of PBI through which teams of trained international volunteer observers are sent to areas of conflict and repression to provide non-violent protective accompaniment to local human rights defenders. Field programmes are currently operating in Colombia, Guatemala, Indonesia, Mexico and Nepal.

Although PBI UK is constituted as an independent body with separate legal responsibility, it adheres to guiding principles of PBI laid down at an international level and continued use of the PBI name is dependent on this.

Objectives and activities

The objects of the charity are:

'to promote human rights for the benefit of the public by

1.Securing the enforcement of human rights law and promoting the sound administration of human rights law through accompanying and observing persons from organisations promoting human rights and preventing human rights abuses and people whose lives are in danger from the work they do provided that this work does not extend to promoting a political purpose (including a change in the law or government policy or the administrative decisions of the government authorities); and

2. Raising awareness of human rights and human rights abuses provided that this work does not extend to promoting a political purpose (including a change in the law or government policy or the administrative decisions of government authorities).

For the purposes of this object 'human rights' means the abolition of torture, slavery, forced labour, extra-judicial killing (such as genocide) and those rights secured under or by virtue of:

- a. Legislation adopted in the country in which the rights are being promoted by the Charity or:
- b. International law (more particularly the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and the International Covenant of Civil and Political Rights) having effect in the country in which the rights are being promoted by the Charity'

Objectives and activities - continued

In carrying out its objects, the activities of PBI UK include;

- raising and providing financial support directly to the PBI field programmes
- undertaking an extensive program of outreach, awareness-raising and media work through the organisation of speaking events and tours for human rights defenders and returned PBI volunteers, and the running of stalls at relevant conferences, universities and other appropriate events.
- providing regular newsletters, project updates and other publications concerning its human rights work.
- acting as an initial recruitment stage in the UK for field volunteers, and the organisation of training weekends each year to introduce potential volunteers to the principles, philosophy and work of PBI.
- maintaining an emergency support network of Members of Parliament, Members of the Scottish Parliament, Lords, Members of the European Parliament, legal professionals and others, which can be activated to exert immediate international pressure in the case of human rights abuses. This aspect of advocacy work also includes providing regular briefings and updates to the desk officers at the Foreign and Commonwealth Office and other relevant parties.

With limited staff resources, the nature and ethos of PBI UK is such that many of its activities are carried out on a voluntary basis and it is considered that a significantly above average level of human resource is provided by its team of highly committed volunteers. It is not practicable at present to quantify the value of the many hundreds of unpaid hours they contribute each year but this time is crucial to the effectiveness of the organisation's work.

Achievements, performance and financial review

As an established country group within the PBI umbrella, PBI UK continued to successfully develop and expand its core activities throughout 2007 whilst maintaining a stable financial position both up to the year end and beyond. Particular progress was made during the year in widening awareness and knowledge of our operations amongst new audiences and sectors, many of whom, it is hoped, will provide important help and support in the years to come.

PBI UK's strong track record in recruiting suitable volunteers for training and subsequent deployment in the field was well maintained and, towards the end of 2007, the number of PBI UK-originated volunteers operating overseas numbered 17(Colombia 3, Guatemala 4, Indonesia 8, Mexico 1 and Nepal 1). In this regard, a positive sign for the future was our success in increasing the number of initial training courses for potential volunteers to 3 in the year from the usual 2. These sessions are usually organised over a weekend at a Youth Hostel, and the additional course allowed us to give a wider choice of geographical location to attendees.

The well-being of field volunteers, many of whom are faced with challenging and demanding situations in their overseas placements, is taken very seriously within the organisation and an important development this year was to introduce a short rehabilitation course to support returned personnel making the transition back into post-field life. This course supplements the program of regular "check in" phone calls for all returned volunteers.

Achievements, performance and financial review - continued

A particular aspect of PBI UK's operation is the continued involvement of volunteers who return to the UK after a placement overseas. At least 13 were active in this way in 2007 in a variety of ways, for example by giving talks and running stalls throughout the country as part of an initiative to raise the profile of PBI operations within the academic sector and beyond. They also play an important role in the organisation and running of outreach events such as speaking tours by human rights defenders, and participating in local and national media coverage of their experiences.

A major theme this year was the considerable success in increasing PBI's profile amongst a number of key relevant audiences. Critical to this initiative was the implementation of a patrons strategy which led to the recruitment of a number of eminent patrons (listed at page 1) who provided considerable assistance in widening awareness of the work and establishing important connections in the legal and governmental sectors. This culminated in the hosting of an October reception at the House of Lords, attended by over 50 senior judges, lawyers and politicians, which allowed us to give an important platform to visiting human rights defender, Eduardo Carreno Wilches of the CCAJAR Lawyers Collective, Colombia, as well as providing a vital opportunity to promote PBI to an influential group.

Further important publicity and support was secured by an October broadcast on the regular BBC Radio 4 appeal program, recorded by our patron Julie Christie, which included a description of the courage and bravery of one of the human rights defenders we accompany in Colombia, Soraya Gutierrez. This spread knowledge of protective accompaniment to many listeners who would have been previously unaware of PBI and achieved a valuable £6,000 of donations towards PBI UK work in 2007.

External recognition of the value and importance of our work also came with the joint award to Daniel Carey, one of our volunteers operating in Guatemala, of the prestigious Law Society New Solicitor of the Year award. This brought useful additional media interest, alongside other coverage on the BBC World Service and articles in the Counsel, LexisNexis, Guardian Abroad and the Times on-line.

PBI UK continued to play an important role in organising and facilitating speaking events and briefing opportunities for human rights defenders visiting the UK who, in 2007, included the following:

- Alirio Uribe and Eduardo Carrenyo, of the Jose Alvear Restrepo Lawyers Collective(CCAJAR), from Colombia.
- Liliana Uribe, from the Legal Corporation for Judicial Freedom
- Father Henry Ramirez Soler and Cecilia Naranjo, members of the Interchurch Commission for Justice and Peace, Colombia.
- Jose Giron, human rights defender and president of the Institute of Popular Training(Colombia)
- Neil Arias, human rights lawyer at the Tlachinolan Human Rights Centre(Mexico)
- Mr Peneas Lokbere, Indonesian human rights defender and survivor of the year 2000 Adepura Case, Indonesia

We have developed a very constructive and active relationship with the new Human Rights, Governance and Democracy unit with the Foreign & Commonwealth Office("FCO") particularly around the effective implementation of EU Guidelines for Human Rights Defenders protection and continue to meet regularly with other officials at the FCO (Heads of Section and desk officers for Colombia, Mexico, Guatemala, Indonesia and Nepal).

We were part of a round table at the Foreign Office on the United Nations Human Rights Council and have had ongoing meetings/input with the FCO representative prior to UN Council meetings. We have also been invited to other UN and international coalition meetings where we will be able to advocate on behalf of human rights defenders.

The emergency support network, including MP's, MSP's, Lords and legal professionals, was expanded to around 80 at the year-end and was activated on 4 occasions during 2007 in response to human rights abuses in Colombia, Indonesia, Mexico and Nepal.

Achievements, performance and financial review - continued

During the year, the PBI UK website'www.peacebrigades.org.uk' was fully redesigned and launched successfully in conjunction with the BBC Appeal. It is regularly updated and provides a thorough description of what we do, where we work, and news from the projects. It has recently been receiving approximately 3000 hits per week.

Overall, total spending by PBI UK amounted to £276,060 in the year, an increase from £242,845 in 2006, whilst incoming resources increased to £286,400 from £245,609 in 2006, which allowed for a modest addition to reserves at the year end. In this context, the policy of the Trustees is to maintain a general reserve of unrestricted funds equal to 3 months future core expenditure. Ongoing financial management is carried out on the basis that any excess over this target at a year-end is budgeted to be used to fund operations in the subsequent year. As regards investments, where funds can be identified with reasonable certainty as being surplus to immediate requirements, short-term deposits for 3 or 6 months are made with the charity's bankers.

Fund-raising for the PBI field projects reached record levels in 2007; the securing of a £30,000 grant from a new funder(the R M Laing Foundation) in addition to continuing major support from the Sigrid Rausing Trust and the Prisoners of Conscience Fund, as well as an individual donation of £5,000, helped boost total funds transferred direct to field projects to £149,061 in 2007 compared to £128,625 in 2006. The new grant of £30,000 is primarily in respect of PBI work accompanying environmental workers under threat, an area of our operations that is attracting increasing interest.

Since the year-end, a further grant of £150,000 (of which £100,000 is restricted for funding to field projects) has been committed by the Sigrid Rausing Trust. Further income instalments of £10,000 are also anticipated in 2008 from the Bromley Trust, the Allan & Nesta Ferguson Trust, and the Tinsley Foundation under 3 year cycles of support which has enabled Trustees to set a balanced budget for 2008 maintaining all basic U.K. operations.

In recognition of the rapid growth of PBI UK over the last few years, it was timely to secure a grant from the Charities Aid Foundation in the form of an external charity "health check" carried out in 2007 by one of their expert consultants. This affirmed the value of our existing operations and provided several important ideas for the future, particularly in the development of a more integrated and diversified outreach and fund-raising strategy.

Trustees wish to express their immense thanks to the efforts of all staff, volunteers, patrons, donors, funders and supporters who have contributed to a further successful year of PBI UK activity. We want to give special mention to our co-ordinator, Susi Bascon, for her continued professionalism and dedication to PBI UK throughout the year. We are also very grateful to our other staff, Lani Parker, Anna Jones, Louise Winstanley and Keith Smith, our accountant, for their excellent work over the year. Anna left shortly before the year end having enhanced our fund-raising operation considerably over the past 2 years and we are grateful to Pam Feldman for taking over on a temporary basis whilst a new permanent fund-raiser is recruited.

Since the year end, Andrew Kendle has retired as Trustee after over 6 years of involvement with PBI UK. Trustees wish to record their particular thanks to him for all his hard work and commitment over his term.

Notes to the financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2007

1. Accounting Policies

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities(SORP 2005, issued in March 2005), applicable accounting standards and the Companies Act 1985.

Incoming resources

Grants and donations are accounted for as soon as their amount and receipt are certain. In the case of donations this is usually when received. All other income is accounted for on a receivable basis, including Gift Aid reclaims. Grants received prior to the year end, relating to funding applications for expenditure in future financial years, are deferred and included in creditors. Donations in kind are recognised when the value to the charity can be quantified and a third party is bearing the cost.

Resources expended

Expenditure is included on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed, they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Expenditure includes irrecoverable VAT where applicable.

Allocation of costs

Costs are allocated to spending categories on a basis designed to represent the use of the resource. Costs relating to a particular activity are allocated directly where possible, staff costs are allocated on the basis of actual or estimated time spent, and support costs(primarily spending on premises)are apportioned on an appropriate basis e.g. floor space.

Fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets costing more than £500 are capitalised. Computer and office equipment is written off on a straight-line basis over their estimated useful life of 3 years.

Stock

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

Leasing

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight line basis over the lease term.

Intangible Income

Donations in kind are included, where practicable, at the financial cost to the provider of the service. Volunteer time is not included in the financial statements.

Fund accounting

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by the donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements. Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objects of the charity.
